About this activity

Following their visit to Blackgang Chine (or pre-visit if desired), students learn about coastal erosion, focusing particularly on how chines are formed. They will then learn how to use 4-figure grid references, and the eight points of a compass, to locate chines on a map. They will also learn how to explain a geographical process with clarity, and put this in writing.

The resource is designed for students in lower key stage 2.

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
Students learn about coastal erosion, focusing particularly on how chines are formed.

They will practise using 4-figure grid references and will also learn how to explain a geographical process with clarity, and put this in writing.

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information poster for an Isle of Wight Visitor centre. On this information poster, they will have to show where chines can be located, using 4-figure grid-references and directional language.

They will also include an explanation with regards to how chines are formed, due to the process of erosion. The poster will need to use photographs and students will learn how to use a variety of presentational devices in order to display their information clearly.



low does this link to my child's learning?

- Students will be learning about the process of coastal erosion and how to use mapping (and directional skills) in order to locate chines on the Isle of Wight.
- They will learn how to write an explanation of a geographical process and present information clearly.
- Finally, they will evaluate their final outcome in relation to the work of others

What will they learn?

- Students will learn how to use 4-figure grid references on an OS
- They will learn how erosion changes a landscape.
- They will learn how to use the language of direction, with reference to locations on a map.
- They will learn how to write an explanatory text, linked to a geographical process.

How does this enrich study undertaken in school

What do they need to have done in preparation?

- Students may have learnt about different forms of coastal erosion and the vocabulary associated with this topic.
- They may have visited the 'Coast' exhibition at Blackgang Chine.

What skills do they need to demonstrate?

- Identifying features of landscapes.
- ▶ An understanding of the impact of coastal erosion.
- ▶ How to use grid references and the language of direction in order to pin-point locations.
- Writing skills.
- Presentational skills.
