Human Geography: Diversification/Leisure

About this activity

Before their visit to the Tapnell Farm Park, students will learn a little bit of background to the farm. They will use a range of different resources, including maps, photographs, and specific Isle of Wight tourism sites, to find out where Tapnell Farm Park is located, and what it was like before and during 'diversification', and what it is like now.

All of this will prepare them fully for the activities that they will complete during their visit. Then, whilst on-site, students will carry

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strategies in place, and how Tapnell Farm Park is attempting to be sustainable and encourage eco-tourism.

Through the activities, there are also 'cross-over' opportunities with both a literacy and a numeracy focus to develop these vital skills alongside their geographical learning. On their return to school, there is guidance on the worksheet which guides them through creating a newspaper article based on what they have learnt about the farm.

Isle of Wight, which has diversified from dairy farming into tourism and recreation in recent years. They will be investigating the range of facilities, attractions, and amenities that the farm has to offer during their visit.



Questions & Answers

What is the task?

- This is a geography task which enables students to make first-hand observations of the human geography (farming, farm diversification, tourism and leisure, and sustainability) of a specific area/attraction.
- ▶ Students will learn about the human geography of the area; specifically, they will learn about the tourism and leisure related activities taking place, the ways in which the farm has diversified from dairy farming, and the ways that potential issues are managed as sustainably as possible.
- ▶ The activities on the worksheet guide students through learning key terms and their definitions, what tourism and leisure 'looks' like in reality through investigating a specific attraction, and encourages them to think 'outside the box' when it comes to identifying and discussing issues and sustainable management strategies.
- Activities with a numeracy and/or literacy focus develop these fundamental skills.

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What will they learn?

- ► How to define the meaning of the terms 'diversification' and 'sustainable' and other associated key geographical concepts such as 'honeypot site' and 'ethical or eco-tourism'.
- ▶ What current facilities at Tapnell Farm Park are like, and how things have changed in recent years as the farm has diversified its activities.
- ► How diversification at Tapnell Farm Park has resulted in a wide range of tourism and leisure attractions and facilities.
- ▶ What issues are associated with the developments at Tapnell Farm Park, and how these are managed for the enjoyment of visitors and sustainability.

How does this enrich study undertaken in school?

- Nothing beats first-hand experience of what is learnt in school. Seeing the site, and the recreational and customer facilities at Tapnell Farm Park first-hand will allow them to appreciate the different and varied leisure activities that take place on a diversified farm. It will allow them to really 'think through' and apply what they learn in school; fieldwork literally brings to life the learning that takes place in the classroom.
- This activity involves a lot of fundamental skills in geography; map work, research and graphical skills, as well as conducting primary fieldwork such as making observations, and recording information which can then be analysed. Numeracy and literacy skills are also developed through some of the activities.
- ▶ Also, good fieldwork is fun! Students have the opportunity to fully engage with the subject and immerse themselves in it; something which will hopefully enthuse them and instill in them a curiosity about the world around them for the rest of their lives.
- ► Tapnell Farm Park is an excellent and completely 'current' example of farm diversification and how dairy farmers are adapting to the modern world. Also, the developments that have taken place here are very much in harmony with and are, as far as possible, sustainable. Seeing this first hand, and considering the ways in which Tapnell is attempting to be as sustainable as possible, helps students to consider their own lives, activities and role in the world, as well as that of larger organisations.



What do they need to have done in preparation?

- Students can use the internet and/or books to ensure that they fully understand the meaning of the key terms listed above.

▶ It is beneficial for students to have a secure understanding of the key terms and theory before they visit

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ability students will be provided with hints, additional guidance and sentence starters/writing frames to assist them with this, as well as the support of their teacher.

- ✓ Numeracy drawing accurate graphs from a set of data, and interpreting what they show. Again, lower ability students are provided with a graph 'frame' with scales and axis labels to help them with this.
- ✓ Working with others collaborating and cooperating with other students to complete activities and support each other's understanding.
- ✓ Working independently showing that they can follow instructions to complete an activity on their own within the time frame and following the expectations given to them.
